Animal Damage Control – District #2

Below is a snapshot of the work Idaho Wildlife Services (WS) has done in the last twelve months in ADC District 2 from November 1, 2024, through October 31, 2025. During this time frame, there has been 18 different WS employees working in your District to some degree. These employees include year-round and seasonal Wildlife Specialists (trappers), pilots, gunners, and range riders. Out of these WS employees, District 2 has 3.5 trappers that spend almost 100% of their time in this District. Currently we are trying to refill the Caldwell position.

All ten counties within District 2 have requested and received assistance from one or more WS employees in the last twelve months. The ADC work, which is primarily coyote related, but not limited to, took place on ~143 private properties, ~64 BLM allotments, ~5 State land allotments, and ~47 Forest Service allotments.

During the last twelve months within District 2, WS responded to wildlife damage complaints relating to the following animals listed below.

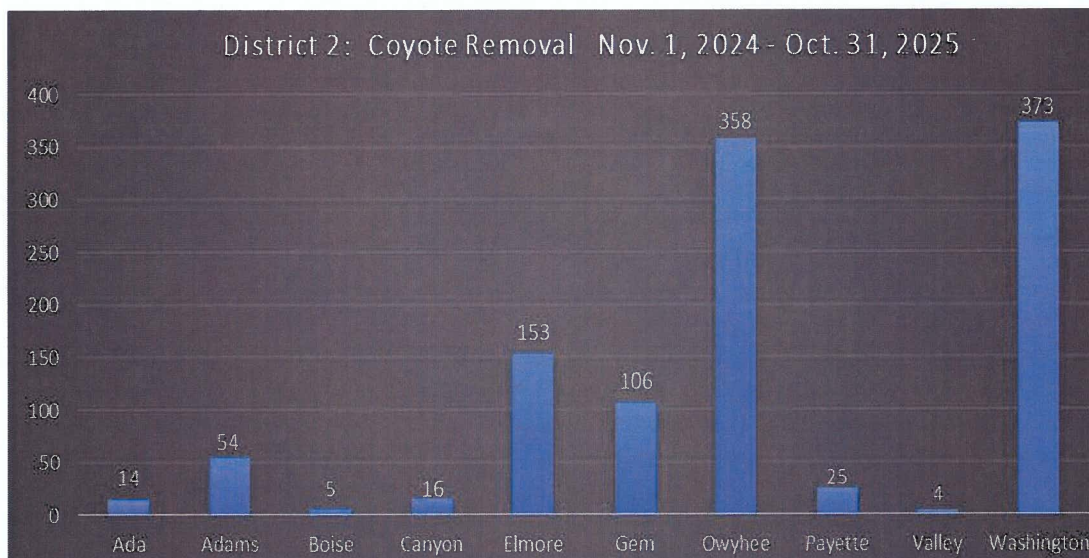

The requests to assist with these animals were to reduce and/or prevent damage to the private property listed below.

In response to the listed private property damage, those 18 WS employees worked within the District for a combined total of 4,065 hours. Time spent responding to most of the species listed did not get charged to the District 2 agreement, but represents all work WS did in District 2, which in turn benefits District 2.

Responding to predator complaints is a major part of the work WS does in District 2. The graphs below will show the coyote and wolf removals in response to requests and confirmed damage in the respective counties.



In District 2 there were 1108 coyotes removed in the ten counties.

Although the District 2 agreement doesn't pay for any wolf work the information below provides an update on the work for the last twelve months within the district. WS removed 16 wolves and collared 1 wolf in ADC 2. An additional wolf was removed in Idaho County just north of the Adams County line in ADC 1.

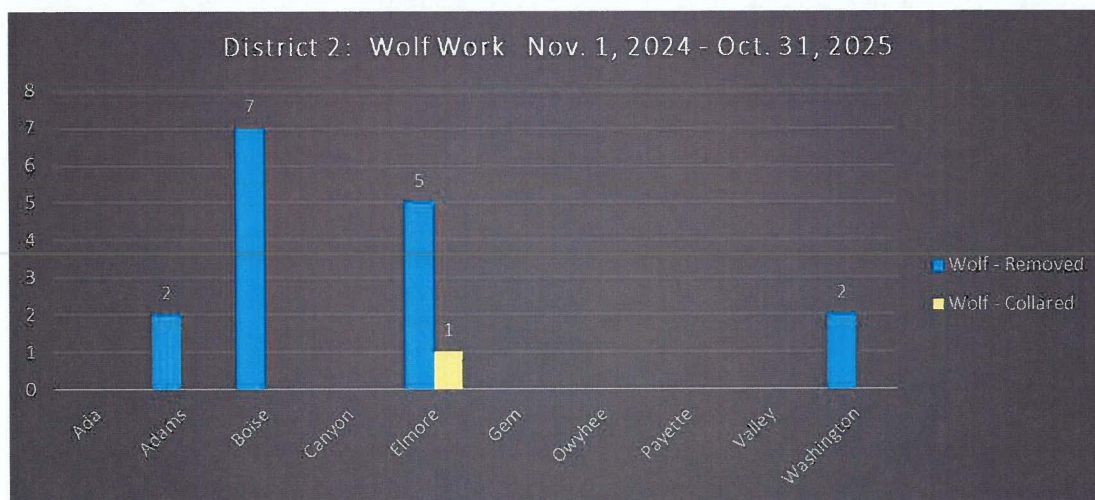

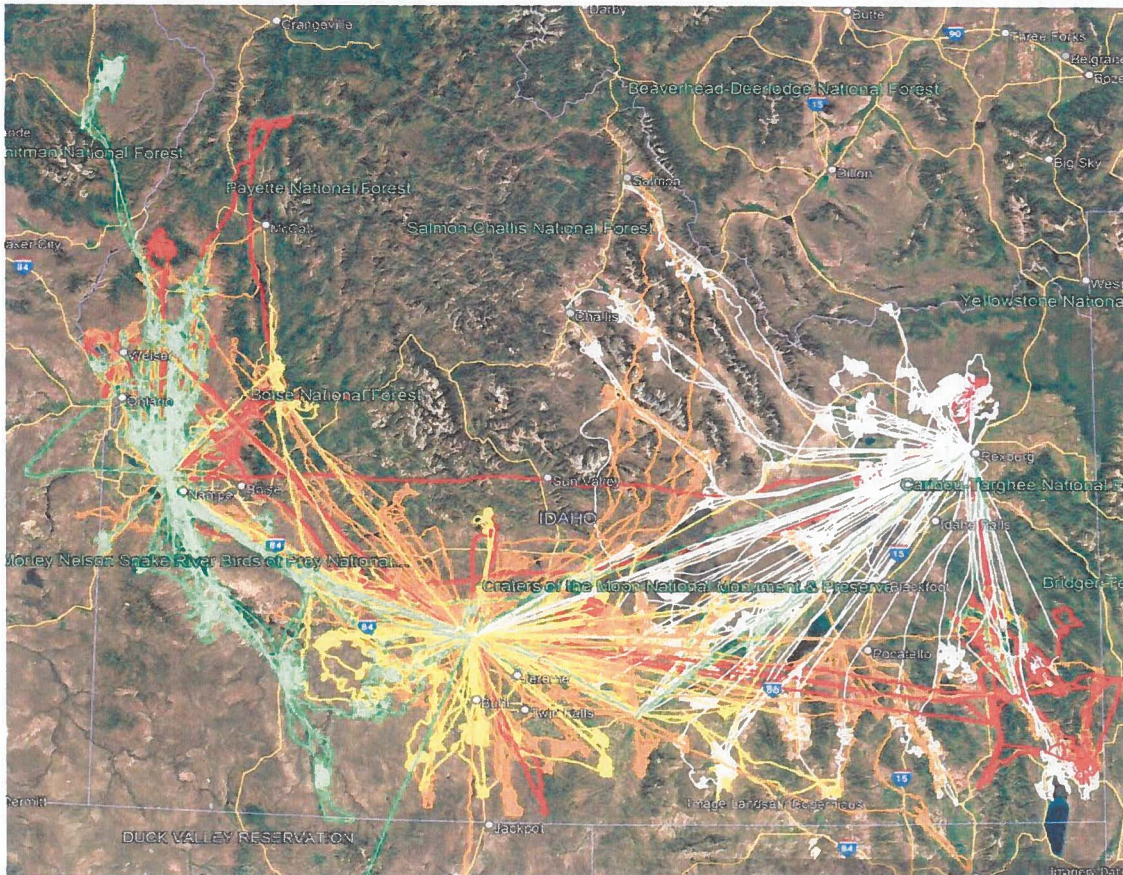
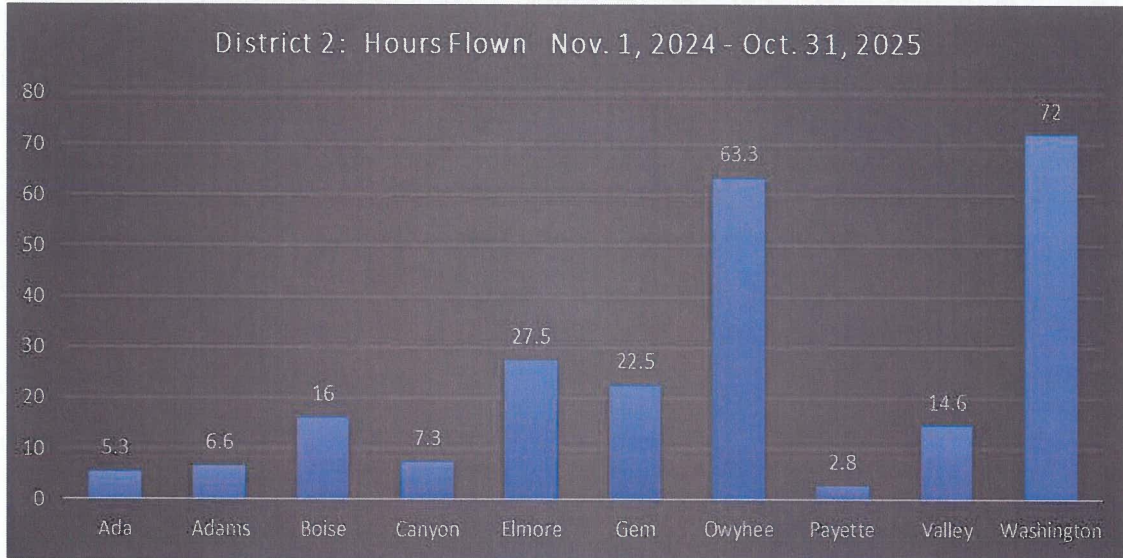

During this time frame, ~237.9 hours (Hobbs) were flown in District 2 responding to coyote and wolf related conflicts, which included a combination of fixed-wing and helicopter flights. Additionally, WS aircrafts flew ~4.5 hours in Oregon to assist two livestock producers who reside in District 2, but graze in Oregon for a brief time each year. The graph below shows fixed-wing and helicopter time in the respective counties.
